# Duties of the Attorney General

1. Represents more than 100 State agencies, boards, and commissions.
2. Protects the people of Minnesota as chief enforcer of the State's consumer-protection, antitrust, and charities laws.
3. Defends the constitutionality of State statutes when appropriate.
4. Partner to county attorneys: upon request of a county attorney, supports county attorneys, especially ones from smaller counties, in criminal-justice-related matters.

# Returning money to the State of Minnesota

- Recovered \$81 million from Big Tobacco corporations for past-due obligations under the 1998 tobacco settlement. This \$81 million goes into the general fund, with an additional \$10 million going into the general fund each year thereafter.
- Nearly \$300 million to Minnesota from the historic \$26 billion multistate settlement agreements with pharmaceutical distributors McKesson, Cardinal Health, and AmerisourceBergen, and opioid manufacturer Johnson & Johnson.

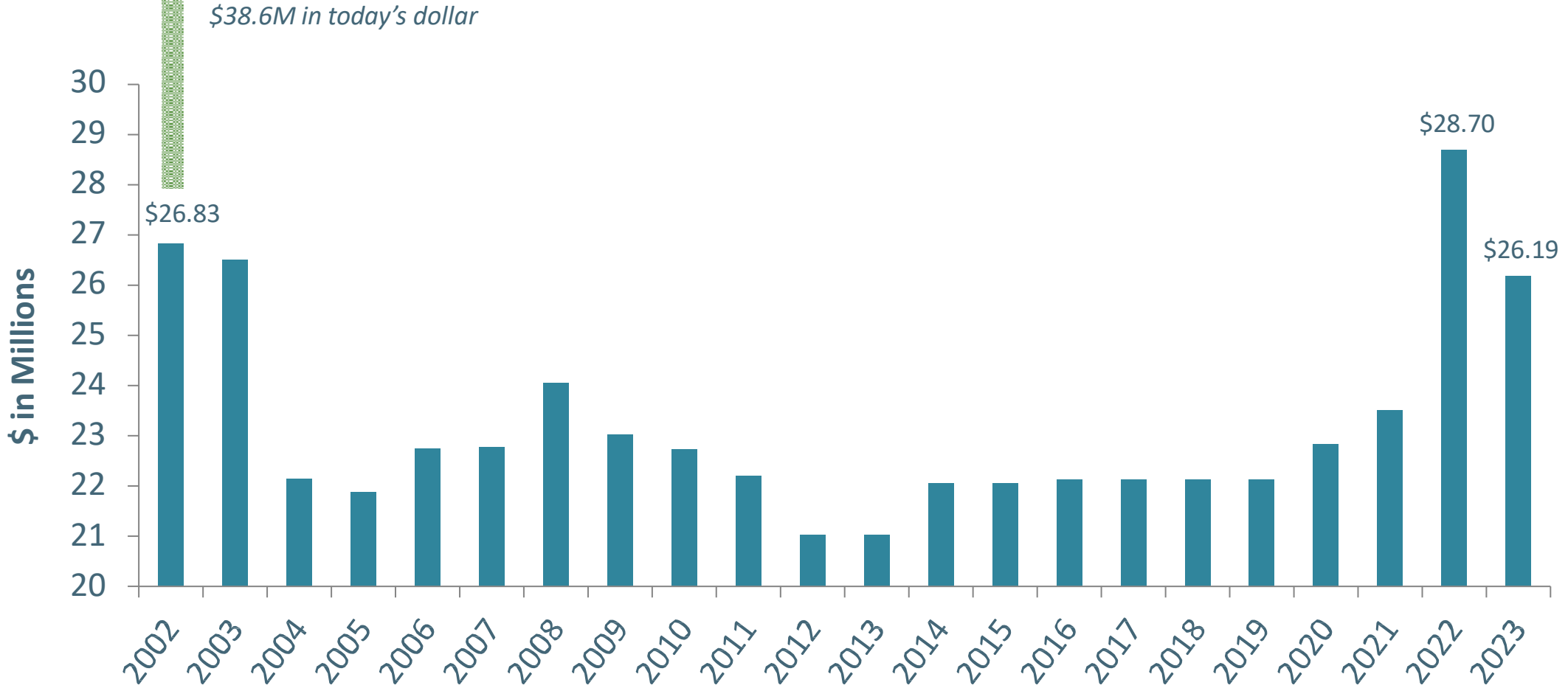
*Note: Though the AGO wins millions of dollars in awards for the State of Minnesota, it does not receive any of this money for its own budget.*

# Returning money directly to Minnesota taxpayers

- In the last year, Attorney General's Office returned \$54 million in restitution and debt relief to student-loan borrowers defrauded by Minnesota School of Business/Globe University and Navient
- In the last fiscal year, Consumer Action division intervened with companies on consumers' behalf and returned \$7.8 million directly back to Minnesotans. This represents nearly a 40% increase in money returned to Minnesotans over the prior fiscal year.

# AGO General Fund Appropriations

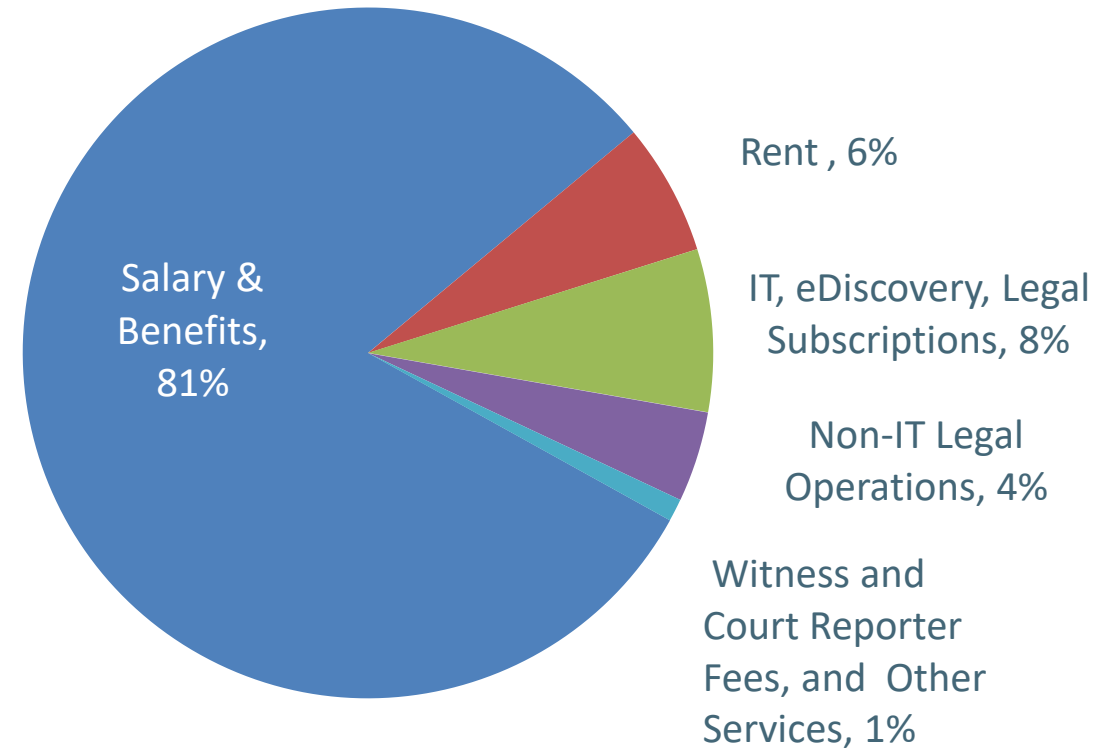
*(in actual dollars)*



# Uses of the Funds

FY 2021 Spending by Category

- **Largest cost driver** continues to be the salaries and benefits that support our employees
- **Significant investments** made in IT and eDiscovery in FY 2021



# FY 23 Supplemental Budget Request

## \$1.821 million: Enhanced Criminal Enforcement and Initiatives

- Increased staff to accept requests from county attorneys in cases such as violent or complex crimes, sex trafficking, cross-county crimes, and financial exploitation, as well as habeas corpus petitions
- Legal staff to expand the Criminal Division
  - Attorneys (7 FTE)
  - Legal Assistants (2 FTE)
- 3.3% increase to base budget

# FY 23 Supplemental Budget Request

In last 3 years, AGO Criminal Division has investigated, made charging decisions about, and prosecuted 33 cases of violent crime across Minnesota

- Murder, manslaughter, criminal vehicular homicide, criminal sexual conduct

28 of 33 cases assisted 18 county attorneys in Greater Minnesota

- Aitkin, Becker, Beltrami, Carlton, Chippewa, Clearwater, Cook, Cottonwood, Fillmore, Freeborn, Grant, Le Sueur, Morrison, Pennington, Renville, Roseau, Todd, Traverse



# FY 23 Supplemental Budget Request

## \$2.335 million: Operating Adjustment

- Compensation increases and inflation adjustments for talent retention
- 4.3% increase to base budget
- Non-legal, highly skilled staff who enable and enhance the work of the entire office (7 FTE)
  - Information Technology, Finance, & Human Resources
  - Policy & Communications
  - Outreach, including Special Outreach & Protection Unit
