NINETY-FOURTH LEGISLATURE

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St. Paul, Minnesota, Thursday, March 5, 2026

The Senate met at 11:00 a.m. and was called to order by the President.

## CALL OF THE SENATE

Senator Murphy imposed a call of the Senate. The Sergeant at Arms was instructed to bring in the absent members.

Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rabbi Esther Adler.

The President declared a quorum present.

The reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal, as printed and corrected, was approved.

## REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Senator Murphy moved that the Committee Reports at the Desk be now adopted. The motion prevailed.

**Senator McEwen from the Committee on Labor, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 2533:** A bill for an act relating to employment; providing that stay-or-pay provisions are prohibited, unenforceable, and against public policy; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 177.27, subdivision 4; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 181.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 2, line 7, delete "2025" and insert "2026"

Page 2, line 24, after the period, insert "A stay-or-pay provision does not include an employee's agreement to repay the cost of training the employee received from an apprenticeship program constituted pursuant to United States Code, title 29, section 186(c)(6), back to that apprenticeship program."

Page 3, line 5, before the period, insert ", payable to the employee aggrieved"

Page 3, after line 8, insert:

"Subd. 4. **Exception.** The prohibition in this section does not apply to an agreement related to the repayment of the cost of tuition for a transferable credential that meets all of the following requirements:

(1) the agreement is made separately from any contract for employment;

(2) the agreement does not require obtaining the transferable credential as a condition of employment;

(3) the agreement specifies the repayment amount before the worker agrees to the agreement, and the repayment amount does not exceed the cost to the employer of the transferable credential received by the worker;

(4) the agreement provides for a prorated repayment amount during any required employment period that is proportional to the total repayment amount and the length of the required employment period and does not require an accelerated payment schedule if the worker separates from the employment; and

(5) the agreement does not require repayment to the employer by the worker if the worker is terminated, except if the worker is terminated for misconduct.

Subd. 5. **Choice of law; venue.** (a) An employer must not require an employee who primarily resides and works in Minnesota, as a condition of employment, to agree to a provision in an agreement or contract that would do either of the following:

(1) require the employee to adjudicate outside of Minnesota a claim arising in Minnesota; or

(2) deprive the employee of the substantive protection of Minnesota law with respect to a controversy arising in Minnesota.

(b) Any provision of a contract or agreement that violates paragraph (a) is voidable at any time by the employee and if a provision is rendered void at the request of the employee, the matter shall be adjudicated in Minnesota and Minnesota law shall govern the dispute.

(c) In addition to injunctive relief and any other remedies available, a court may award an employee who is enforcing rights under this section reasonable attorney fees.

(d) For purposes of this section, adjudication includes litigation and arbitration.

(e) This subdivision applies only to claims arising under this section."

Page 3, line 19, delete "2025" and insert "2026"

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 3, after the semicolon, insert "providing exceptions;"

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

**Senator Klein from the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 3650:** A bill for an act relating to commerce; prohibiting manufacturers from advertising prescription drugs on television; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 325F.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 1, delete line 9

Page 1, line 10, delete "(c)" and insert "(b)"

Page 1, after line 10, insert:

"(c) "Television advertisement" means a form of paid marketing communication designed to promote products, services, or brands through an over-the-air broadcast or an internet-based, nonbroadcast stream of an over-the-air broadcast."

Page 1, line 11, delete "A manufacturer is prohibited from using televised" and insert "Television"

Page 1, line 12, delete "to advertise" and insert "for" and delete "direct" and before the period, insert "are prohibited"

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, delete "manufacturers from advertising" and insert "the advertisement of"

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

**Senator Klein from the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 3769:** A bill for an act relating to health care; continuing to disallow drug manufacturers from restricting delivery of 340B prescription drugs; providing for enforcement; removing an expiration date; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 62J.96, by adding a subdivision; repealing Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 62J.96, subdivision 3.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety. Report adopted.

**Senator Klein from the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 1943:** A bill for an act relating to commerce; prohibiting pet shops from selling cats and dogs; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, sections 325F.79; 325F.791, subdivisions 1, 5; 325F.792, subdivision 2; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 325F.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 325F.79, is amended to read:

**325F.79 DEFINITIONS.**

For purposes of sections 325F.79 to 325F.792, the following definitions apply:

(a) "Advertisement" means an oral, written, graphic, or pictorial statement made in the course of soliciting business. Advertisement includes without limitation a statement or representation:

(1) made in a newspaper, magazine, or other public publication;

(2) contained in a notice, sign, billboard, poster, display, circular, pamphlet, or letter; or

(3) made on radio, television, or the Internet.

~~(a)~~ (b) "Animal" means a dog, wholly or in part of the species *Canis familiaris*, or a cat, wholly or in part of the species *Felis domesticus*.

~~(b)~~ (c) "Pet dealer" means any person, firm, partnership, corporation, or association, including breeders, that is required to collect sales tax for the sale of animals to the public. Pet dealer does not include humane societies, nonprofit organizations performing the functions of humane societies, or animal control agencies.

~~(c)~~ (d) "Breeder" means any person, firm, partnership, corporation, or association that breeds animals for direct or indirect sale to the public.

~~(d)~~ (e) "Broker" means a person, firm, partnership, corporation, or association that purchases animals for resale to other brokers or pet dealers.

~~(e)~~ (f) "Health problem" means any disease, illness, or congenital or hereditary condition which would impair the health or function of the animal that is apparent at the time of sale, or which should have been apparent to the seller from the veterinary history of the animal.

(g) "Pet shop" means a pet dealer that operates a physical retail store from which animals are sold or offered for sale to the general public, whether through an appointment or otherwise.

~~(f)~~ (h) "Veterinarian" means a licensed veterinarian in the state of Minnesota.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 325F.791, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Disclosure.** (a) Every pet dealer shall deliver to each retail purchaser of an animal written disclosure as follows:

~~(a)~~ (1) the name, address, and USDA license number of the breeder and any broker who has had possession of the animal; the date of the animal's birth; the date the pet dealer received the animal; the breed, sex, color, and identifying marks of the animal; the individual identifying tag, tattoo, or collar number; the name and registration number of the sire and dam and the litter number; and a record of inoculations, worming treatments, and medication received by the animal while in the possession of the pet dealer; and

~~(b)~~ (2) a statement signed by the pet dealer that the animal has no known health problem, or a statement signed by the pet dealer disclosing any known health problem and a statement signed by a veterinarian that recommends necessary treatment; and

(3) a copy of all available state or federal inspection reports for the animal's breeder for all inspections that occurred during the three years preceding the date the animal was purchased.

(b) The disclosure shall be made part of the statement of consumer rights set forth in subdivision 10. The disclosure required in paragraph (a), clause (1), need not be made for mixed breed animals if the information is not available and cannot be determined by the pet dealer.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 325F.791, subdivision 5, is amended to read:

Subd. 5. **Responsibilities of purchaser.** (a) To obtain the remedies provided in subdivision 6, the purchaser shall with respect to an animal with a health problem:

~~(a)~~ (1) notify the pet dealer, within two business days, of the diagnosis by a veterinarian of the purchaser's choosing of a health problem and provide the pet dealer with the name and telephone number of the veterinarian and a copy of the veterinarian's report on the animal; and

~~(b)~~ (2) if the purchaser wishes to receive a full refund for the animal, return the animal no later than two business days after receipt of a written statement from a veterinarian indicating the animal is unfit due to a health problem.

(b) With respect to a dead animal the purchaser must provide the pet dealer a written statement from a veterinarian, indicating the animal died from a health problem which existed on or before the receipt of the animal by the purchaser.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date.

Sec. 4. **[325F.7915] SALE OF DOGS AND CATS PROHIBITED.**

Subdivision 1. **Prohibition.** A pet shop must not sell, offer to sell, barter, auction, or otherwise transfer ownership of an animal.

Subd. 2. **Adoption of animals.** A pet shop may provide space to a nonprofit humane society, animal control agency, or animal rescue and rehoming organization to offer animals for adoption if the society, agency, or organization qualifies as a nonprofit organization under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Subd. 3. **Ownership interest and fees.** A pet shop is prohibited from having an ownership interest in an animal offered for adoption under subdivision 2 or receiving a fee for providing space for animal adoption.

Subd. 4. **Continued operation.** Notwithstanding subdivision 1, a pet shop that sold or offered for sale an animal from the pet shop's physical premises for at least one year before the effective date of this section may continue to operate as a pet shop and engage in the sale or offer for sale of animals if:

(1) an animal sold or offered for sale by the pet shop on or after the effective date of this section is obtained only from a state-licensed or USDA-licensed breeder; and

(2) in an advertisement to sell or offer for sale a specific animal, including on the animal's display cage or enclosure, the pet shop discloses the breeder's state license number or USDA license number.

Subd. 5. **Local authority.** Notwithstanding this section, a county, city, town, or township may enact and enforce by ordinance stricter regulations regarding the transfer of ownership of animals, including a prohibition on selling or offering for sale animals by a pet dealer or other entity.

Subd. 6. **Violations.** A pet shop that operates as a pet shop pursuant to subdivision 4 that violates this section on three separate occasions is prohibited from selling, offering to sell, bartering, auctioning, or otherwise transferring ownership of an animal.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date.

Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 325F.792, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

Subd. 2. **Civil penalty.** (a) A pet dealer who:

(1) sells an animal without delivery of the disclosure required in section 325F.791, subdivision 1;

- (2) fails to maintain the records required by section 325F.791, subdivision 2;
  - (3) fails to provide registration papers as provided in section 325F.791, subdivision 3;
  - (4) fails to make or provide payment for the examinations required by section 325F.791, subdivision 4;
  - (5) fails to post the notice required by section 325F.791, subdivision 9; or
  - (6) fails to provide the statement of consumer rights required by section 325F.791, subdivision 10,
- is subject to a civil fine of up to \$1,000 per violation.

(b) A pet shop that violates section 325F.7915 is subject to a civil fine of up to \$1,000 per violation. Each transfer of an animal's ownership in violation of section 325F.7915 is a separate violation.

~~(b)~~ (c) Civil fines collected under this subdivision shall be collected by the court and turned over to the prosecuting attorney.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date.

Sec. 6. **SEVERABILITY.**

If a court of competent jurisdiction holds that any section is unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, the invalidity does not affect other sections that can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the sections are severable.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2026, and applies to acts committed on or after that date."

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

**Senator Xiong from the Committee on State and Local Government, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 3887:** A bill for an act relating to local government; allowing watershed districts to self-insure for certain employee health benefits; making technical changes; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 471.617, subdivisions 1, 2, 4, 4a.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 471.617, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **If more than 100 employees; conditions.** A statutory or home rule charter city, county, town, school district, watershed district, watershed management organization, or

instrumentality thereof which has more than 100 employees, may by ordinance or resolution self-insure for any employee health benefits including long-term disability, but not for employee life benefits. Any self-insurance plan shall provide all benefits which are required by law to be provided by group health insurance policies. Self-insurance plans must be certified as provided by section 62E.05 and must be filed and certified by the Department of Commerce before they are issued or delivered to any person in this state.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 471.617, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

Subd. 2. **Jointly.** Any two or more statutory or home rule charter cities, counties, towns, school districts, watershed districts, watershed management organizations, or instrumentalities thereof which together have more than 100 employees may jointly self-insure for any employee health benefits including long-term disability, but not for employee life benefits, subject to the same requirements as an individual self-insurer under subdivision 1. Self-insurance pools under this section are subject to section 62L.045. A self-insurance pool established and operated by one or more service cooperatives governed by section 123A.21 to provide coverage described in this subdivision qualifies under this subdivision, but the individual school district members of such a pool shall not be considered to be self-insured for purposes of section 471.6161, subdivision 8, paragraph (g). The commissioner of commerce may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 14, providing standards or guidelines for the operation and administration of self-insurance pools.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 471.617, subdivision 4, is amended to read:

Subd. 4. **Exclusive representative.** (a) No statutory or home rule charter city ~~or~~, county ~~or~~, town, school district, watershed district, watershed management organization, or instrumentality of any of them shall adopt a ~~self-insured~~ self-insured health benefit plan for any employees represented by an exclusive representative certified pursuant to section 179A.12 without prior notification and consultation on ten days' written notice to the exclusive representative and agreement by the exclusive representative that represents the largest number of employees to be included in the plan.

(b) Prior to a decision to dissolve any self-insurance, trust fund, or dedicated insurance fund created by a single statutory or home rule charter city, county, town, school district, watershed district, watershed management organization, or instrumentality of any of them, either by ordinance or resolution, the employer must provide 30 days' written notice to each exclusive representative of employees and each individual currently receiving health benefits, and also obtain approval for the proposed action by the exclusive representative that represents the largest number of employees included in the plan. All assets from the trust fund must be audited before closure, and remaining assets must be dedicated for use for health insurance benefits for all individuals currently receiving health benefits. This paragraph does not apply to joint self-insurance trusts or pools.

(c) The assets or liabilities of a joint self-insurance trust or pool that is dissolved must be distributed to members of the joint trust or pool in accordance with the joint trust or pool agreement, if any.

Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 471.617, subdivision 4a, is amended to read:

Subd. 4a. **May choose, pay for insurance.** A statutory or home rule charter city, county, town, school district, watershed district, watershed management organization, or instrumentality of any of these entities with a self-insurance health benefit plan, may, upon request of the exclusive

representative of its employees as certified pursuant to section 179A.12, allow the employees of the exclusive representative to enroll, at their own expense, in the health insurance benefit plan."

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, after "districts" insert ", watershed management organizations, and towns"

And when so amended the bill do pass. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

**Senator Xiong from the Committee on State and Local Government, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 2757:** A bill for an act relating to housing; creating local government grant account; establishing grant programs for local governments to pay for certain costs of federal action; appropriating money.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 1, delete subdivisions 2 and 3

Page 1, line 15, delete everything after the third period

Page 1, line 16, delete everything before the first "to" and insert "\$100,000,000 in fiscal year 2026 is appropriated from the general fund"

Page 1, line 17, delete "6" and insert "4"

Page 1, line 19, delete "5" and insert "3" and after the period, insert "This is a onetime appropriation and is available until June 30, 2027."

Page 1, line 21, delete "from the local government legal grant account"

Page 1, line 22, delete "6" and insert "4"

Page 2, line 3, delete "Grants use" and insert "Eligible costs" and delete "Money in the local government legal grant account" and insert "Grants under this section"

Page 2, line 5, delete everything after "include" and insert a colon

Page 2, delete lines 6 to 11 and insert:

"(1) increased administrative costs for programs based on federal changes;

(2) amounts for infrastructure projects that have been canceled or withheld by the federal government;

(3) amounts of expected federal funds that have been canceled or withheld by federal executive order;

(4) costs associated with recovery from Operation Metro Surge; and

(5) legal costs associated with upholding state or local laws that conflict with federal executive orders made effective after January 19, 2025."

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, delete "housing" and insert "state government" and delete "creating local government grant account;"

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

**Senator Hoffman from the Committee on Human Services, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 3780:** A bill for an act relating to human services; requiring commissioner of human services to release unredacted initial Optum reports.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services. Report adopted.

**Senator Hoffman from the Committee on Human Services, to which was referred**

**S.F. No. 3755:** A bill for an act relating to human services; repealing housing stabilization services; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, sections 256B.0658; 256L.03, subdivision 1; Minnesota Statutes 2025 Supplement, sections 245C.03, subdivision 6; 245C.10, subdivision 6; 256B.04, subdivision 21; 256B.0701, subdivision 9; repealing Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 256B.051, subdivisions 1, 4, 7; Minnesota Statutes 2025 Supplement, section 256B.051, subdivisions 2, 3, 5, 6, 6a, 6b, 8, 9, 10.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 2, after line 1, insert:

"Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2025 Supplement, section 245C.04, subdivision 6, is amended to read:

Subd. 6. **Unlicensed home and community-based waiver providers of service to seniors and individuals with disabilities and providers of housing stabilization services.** (a) Providers required to initiate background studies under section 245C.03, subdivision 6, must initiate a study using the electronic system known as NETStudy 2.0 before the individual begins in a position allowing direct contact with persons served by the provider. New providers must initiate a study under this subdivision before initial enrollment if the provider has not already initiated background studies as part of the service licensure requirements.

(b) Except as provided in paragraph (c), the providers must initiate a background study annually of an individual required to be studied under section 245C.03, subdivision 6.

(c) After an initial background study under this subdivision is initiated on an individual by a provider of both services licensed by the commissioner and the unlicensed services under this subdivision, a repeat annual background study is not required if:

(1) the provider maintains compliance with the requirements of section 245C.07, paragraph (a), regarding one individual with one address and telephone number as the person to receive sensitive background study information for the multiple programs that depend on the same background study, and that the individual who is designated to receive the sensitive background information is capable of determining, upon the request of the commissioner, whether a background study subject is providing direct contact services in one or more of the provider's programs or services and, if so, at which location or locations; and

(2) the individual who is the subject of the background study provides direct contact services under the provider's licensed program for at least 40 hours per year so the individual will be recognized by a probation officer or corrections agent to prompt a report to the commissioner regarding criminal convictions as required under section 245C.05, subdivision 7.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Page 6, after line 13, insert:

"Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 256B.04, subdivision 24, is amended to read:

Subd. 24. **Medicaid waiver requests and state plan amendments; notice; public comments.**

(a) The commissioner shall notify the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over medical assistance at least 30 days before submitting a new Medicaid waiver request to the federal government.

(b) Prior to submitting any Medicaid waiver request or Medicaid state plan amendment to the federal government for approval, the commissioner shall publish the text of the waiver request or state plan amendment, and a summary of and explanation of the need for the request, on the agency's website and provide a 30-day public comment period. The commissioner shall notify the public of the availability of this information through the agency's electronic subscription service. The commissioner shall publish the text of all public comments on the agency's website and consider public comments when preparing the final waiver request or state plan amendment that is to be submitted to the federal government for approval.

(c) The commissioner shall also publish on the agency's website notice of any federal decision related to the state request for approval, within 30 days of the decision. This notice must describe any modifications to the state request that have been agreed to by the commissioner as a condition of receiving federal approval.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 6. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 256B.04, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 24a. **Medicaid waiver requests and state plan amendments; prohibited actions.** The commissioner must not take the following actions without prior enactment of legislative authorization:

(1) terminate a medical assistance program, waiver, or benefit;

(2) request federal assistance with terminating a medical assistance program, waiver, or benefit;

or

(3) substantially redesign a medical assistance program, waiver, or benefit.

Sec. 7. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 256B.04, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 28. **Medical assistance prepayment review delays.** (a) The commissioner of human services must comply with the prompt payment requirements under section 62Q.75.

(b) As part of any prepayment review process or methodology imposed on medical assistance claims, the commissioner must fully repay the providers for claims impacted by a delay in payment within 30 days of any prepayment review being completed.

(c) The commissioner may not impose cyclical ongoing payment delays for any medical assistance services in the absence of explicit legislative authorization.

(d) This section does not apply to payment withholds imposed under section 256B.064, subdivision 2.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective upon enactment and applies to all claims submitted to the commissioner on or after October 1, 2025."

Page 7, after line 11, insert:

"(3) demonstrates compliance with federal and state laws and policies for recuperative care services as determined by the commissioner;"

Page 8, delete section 7 and insert:

"Sec. 11. **HOUSING STABILIZATION SERVICES REDESIGN.**

Subdivision 1. **Direction to the commissioner.** The commissioner of human services must develop recommendations for establishing a program to support individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness to obtain and maintain safe, stable housing.

Subd. 2. **Recommendations.** In developing recommendations, the commissioner must:

(1) prioritize establishing a housing services benefit specifically for Minnesota Tribal governments and urban Indian organizations;

(2) utilize evidence-based and promising practices to prevent and reduce homelessness;

(3) identify gaps in available housing services and supports and not duplicate any existing programs;
