(b) The items specified in paragraph (a) may be maintained in any form of record.

(c) The records specified in paragraph (a) may be maintained outside of Minnesota if the records are made accessible to the commissioner upon seven business-days' notice that is sent in a record.

(d) All records maintained by the licensee as required under paragraphs (a) to (c) are open to inspection by the commissioner under section 53B.33, paragraph (a).

Sec. 2. **[53B.521] FOREIGN REMITTANCE TRANSFERS.**

Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have the meanings given.

(b) "Foreign remittance transfer" means a remittance transfer, as defined in United States Code, title 15, section 1693o-1, to a recipient who is located in a country other than the United States.

(c) "Lawfully present" has the meaning given in Code of Federal Regulations, title 45, section 155.20.

Subd. 2. **Verification required.** (a) A licensee is prohibited from initiating a foreign remittance transfer unless the licensee has verified that the sender is lawfully present in the United States.

(b) A sender is required to provide one form of documentation to the licensee to verify the sender is lawfully present in the United States. A licensee must only accept:

(1) a REAL ID;

(2) a driver's license or identification card that:

- (i) complies with all REAL ID Act requirements;
- (ii) is not designated as temporary or limited term; and
- (iii) is current or has been expired for five years or less;
- (3) a valid, unexpired United States passport, including a passport booklet or passport card, issued by the United States Department of State;
- (4) a certified copy of a birth certificate, issued by a government bureau of vital statistics or equivalent agency in the applicant's state of birth, which must bear the raised or authorized seal of the issuing government entity;
- (5) a consular report of birth abroad, certification of report of birth, or certification of birth abroad issued by the United States Department of State, Form FS-240, Form DS-1350, or Form FS-545, as applicable;
- (6) a valid, unexpired permanent resident card issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security or the former Immigration and Naturalization Service of the United States Department of Justice, Form I-551. If the Form I-551 validity period has been automatically extended by the United States Department of Homeland Security, the permanent resident card is deemed unexpired regardless of the expiration date listed;
- (7) a foreign passport with an unexpired temporary Form I-551 stamp or a temporary Form I-551 printed notation on a machine-readable immigrant visa with a United States Department of Homeland Security admission stamp within the validity period;
- (8) a United States Department of Homeland Security Form I-94 or Form I-94A with a photograph and an unexpired temporary Form I-551 stamp;
- (9) a United States Department of State Form DS-232 with a United States Department of Homeland Security admission stamp and validity period;
- (10) a certificate of naturalization issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security, Form N-550 or Form N-570;
- (11) a certificate of citizenship issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security, Form N-560 or Form N-561;
- (12) an unexpired employment authorization document issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security, Form I-766 or Form I-688B. If the Form I-766 validity period has been automatically extended by the United States Department of Homeland Security, the employment authorization document is deemed unexpired regardless of the expiration date listed;
- (13) a valid, unexpired passport issued by a foreign country and a valid, unexpired United States visa accompanied by documentation of the applicant's most recent lawful admittance into the United States; or
- (14) a document designated by the United States Department of Homeland Security under Code of Federal Regulations, title 6, part 37.11(c)(1)(x).

(c) A document provided under paragraph (b) must be legible and unaltered.

(d) The licensee must provide confirmation of verification on forms prescribed by the commissioner. The licensee must submit all required forms to the commissioner no later than the 15th day of the month following the close of each calendar quarter.

Subd. 3. **Right to file a complaint.** (a) A person who has good faith belief that a licensee is failing to comply with this section may file a complaint with the commissioner.

(b) A person who knowingly files a false or frivolous complaint under this subdivision, including any complaint that violates federal law, commits a misdemeanor.

(c) Upon receiving a valid complaint substantiated by evidence of a violation of this section, the commissioner must notify the licensee of the complaint and direct the licensee to pay a penalty pursuant to this section.

Subd. 4. **Audits.** (a) The commissioner must conduct random quarterly audits of licensees to ensure compliance with this section.

(b) A licensee is required to produce records used to verify that each sender of a foreign remittance transfer is lawfully present in the United States.

(c) The division must not audit a licensee more than once every two years unless an audit within the last six months found the licensee did not comply with this section.

Subd. 5. **Penalties.** (a) A licensee must pay a penalty equal to 25 percent of the United States dollar amount transferred, excluding fees or charges imposed by the licensee for a foreign remittance transfer initiated in violation of this section.

(b) The licensee must remit penalties owed under this section to the commissioner quarterly. The licensees must include with the remittance the forms required by the commissioner."

(1) an athletic event or game of skill, or portions thereof or individual performance statistics therein;

(2) any game played with cards, dice, equipment, or any mechanical or electronic device or machine;

(3) war, state or national emergencies, natural or human-made disasters, mass shootings, acts of terrorism, or public health crises, or the ancillary effects thereof;

(4) any event or events happening to a natural person or group of people;

(5) a federal, state, or local election, or the actions or conduct of the federal, state, or local government and the government's agencies, employees, and officers;

(6) legal actions, including but not limited to a civil or criminal suit, grand jury action, jury trial, settlement, plea, or conviction;

(7) the death, assassination, or attempted killing of a person or group of persons, or mass casualty events;

(8) the weather;

(9) events in popular culture, including but not limited to awards and the date a piece of entertainment will be released; and

(10) whether a person will make a particular statement.

(f) "Wager" means a contract, including a prediction market contract, whereby the parties to the contract agree to a gain or loss by one to the other of money, property, or benefit.

Subd. 2. **Prediction markets; hosting prohibited.** A person is guilty of a felony if the person, for consideration and as part of a business:

(1) creates a prediction market;

(2) operates, manages, or controls a platform or system intending that consumers will use the platform or system to make wagers in a prediction market;

(3) intentionally facilitates the operation of a prediction market by:

(i) identifying or listing events knowing the events will be used by consumers to make wagers;

(ii) accepting, holding, or directing the disposition of funds or other things of value for the purpose of allowing consumers to make wagers or to settle wagers made by consumers;

(iii) determining, administering, or enforcing the terms, pricing, or settlement of wagers made by consumers;

(iv) regularly or continuously acting as a counterparty to wagers made by consumers by entering into a wager, offering to enter into a wager, or taking a temporary position in a wager that may be replaced by a different consumer; or

(v) setting or adjusting the prices, odds, or terms that apply to wagers entered into by consumers;

(4) provides data, information, or verification services, including the provision of event outcomes, directly to a prediction market knowing that the data, information, or verification services will be used to allow consumers to make wagers or to settle wagers made by consumers; or

(5) provides supportive services to a prediction market or consumer knowing that the services will be used to identify a consumer's location, transfer funds, or make or process payments for the purpose of allowing consumers to make wagers or to settle wagers made by consumers.

Subd. 3. **Prediction markets; advertising prohibited.** Whoever advertises or markets financial or technological products that promote transactions prohibited under this section is guilty of a felony.

An automated decision system does not include a spam email filter, a firewall, antivirus software, identity and access management tools, a calculator, a database, a dataset, or another compilation of data.

(e) "Automated decision system output" means any information, data, assumptions, predictions, scoring, recommendations, decisions, or conclusions generated by an automated decision system.

(f) "Electronic monitoring tool" means any system, application, or instrument that facilitates the collection of data concerning worker activities, communications, actions, biometrics, or behaviors by means other than direct observation by a person, including but not limited to video or audio surveillance, continuous incremental time-tracking tools, geolocation, electromagnetic tracking, or photoelectronic tracking, or that utilizes a photo-optical system or similar means.

(g) "Employer" means any person who directly or indirectly, or through an agent, vendor, or any other person, employs or exercises control over the wages, benefits, other compensation, hours, working conditions, access to work or job opportunities, or other terms or conditions of employment, of any worker. Employer includes all units of state and local government but does not include the federal government. Employer includes a labor contractor or vendor of a person defined as an employer under this paragraph.

(h) "Employment-related decision" means any decision by an employer that impacts wages, wage setting, benefits, compensation, work hours, work schedule, performance evaluation, hiring, recruitment, discipline, promotion, termination, job tasks, skill requirements, work responsibilities, assignment of work, access to work and training opportunities, productivity requirements, workplace health and safety, and any other terms or conditions of employment. For persons classified as independent contractors or for candidates for employment, an employment-related decision means the equivalent of these decisions based on the person's contract with or relationship to the employer.

(i) "Essential job functions" means the fundamental duties of a position, as revealed by objective evidence such as the amount of time workers spend performing each function, the consequences of not requiring individuals to perform the function, the terms of any applicable collective bargaining agreement, workers' past and present work experiences and performance in the position, and the employer's reasonable, nondiscriminatory judgment of which functions are essential. Past and current written job descriptions and the employer's reasonable, nondiscriminatory judgment of which functions are essential is evidence of which functions are essential for achieving the purpose of the job, but must not be the sole basis for this determination absent the objective evidence described in this paragraph.

(j) "Individualized" means specific to an individual or group, band, class, or tier of individuals with particular personal characteristics, behaviors, or biometrics.

(k) "Vendor" means a third party, subcontractor, or entity engaged by an employer or an employer's labor contractor to provide software, technology, or a related service that is used to collect, store, analyze, or interpret worker data or worker information.

(l) "Worker" means any natural person who is a job applicant to, an employee of, or an independent contractor providing service to or through an employer.

(m) "Worker data" means any information that identifies, relates to, describes, or is reasonably capable of being associated with, or could reasonably be linked, directly or indirectly, with a worker,

regardless of how the information is collected, inferred, or obtained. Worker data includes but is not limited to:

(1) personal identity information, including the worker's name, contact information, government-issued identification numbers, financial information, criminal record, or employment history;

(2) biometric information, including data generated by automatic measurements of a worker's biological characteristics, such as a fingerprint, a faceprint, a voiceprint, eye retinas, or irises, gait, or other unique biological patterns or characteristics that can be used, individually or in combination with other data, to identify or collect information about a worker;

(3) health, medical, lifestyle, and wellness information, including the worker's medical history, physical or mental condition, diet or physical activity patterns, heart rate, medical treatment or diagnosis by a health care professional, health insurance policy number, subscriber identification number, or other unique identifier used to identify the worker; and

(4) any data related to workplace activities, including the following:

(i) human resources information, including the contents of a worker's personnel file or performance evaluations;

(ii) work process information, such as data relating to an individual worker's performance or productivity, including but not limited to the quality and quantities of tasks performed, quality and quantities of items or materials handled or produced, rates or speeds of tasks performed, measurements or metrics of worker performance in relation to a quota, and time categorized as performing tasks or not performing tasks;

(iii) data that captures workplace communications and interactions, including emails, texts, internal message boards, screenshots, and customer interaction and ratings;

(iv) device usage and data, including but not limited to keystroke recording; website, software, and application utilization; calls placed; or geolocation information;

(v) audio, photo, or video data or other information collected from sensors, including movement tracking; thermal sensors; voiceprints; or facial, emotion, and gait recognition;

(vi) inputs to or outputs generated by an automated decision system that are linked to the worker;

(vii) data collected through electronic monitoring or continuous incremental time-tracking tools; and

(viii) data collected or generated on workers to mitigate the spread of infectious diseases, including COVID-19, or to comply with public health measures.

Sec. 3. [181.9922] EMPLOYER PROHIBITIONS; AUTOMATED DECISION SYSTEMS IN EMPLOYMENT SETTINGS.

An employer is prohibited from using an automated decision system to:

- (1) prevent compliance with or cause a violation of any federal, state, or local law or regulation;
- (2) obtain or infer a worker's immigration status; veteran status; ancestral history; religious or political beliefs; health or reproductive status, history, or plan; emotional or psychological state; neural data; sexual or gender orientation; disability; criminal record; or credit history;

Subd. 3. **Portal registration.** All projects covered by state prevailing wage requirements, including but not limited to the requirements under sections 177.41, 177.42, 177.43, and 116J.871, subdivisions 2 and 3, must be registered in the portal by the project owner and assigned an identifying project number prior to the commencement of work.

Subd. 4. **Reporting and notice requirements.** (a) All contractors covered by state prevailing wage requirements, including but not limited to the requirements under sections 177.41, 177.42, 177.43, and 116J.871, subdivisions 2 and 3, must report the certified payroll information required under subdivision 2 and section 177.30 to the commissioner.

(b) The commissioner must provide notice to the project owner when a report is made by a contractor under this section.

Subd. 5. **Fulfillment of other prevailing wage reporting requirements.** Notwithstanding section 177.43, subdivision 6, submission of certified payrolls under this section fulfills the contractor reporting requirements under sections 177.30, paragraph (a), clause (6), and 177.43, subdivision 3, but does not diminish the prevailing wage enforcement authority of the Department of Labor and Industry.

Subd. 6. **Local governments and project owner opt-in.** Local units of government and project owners may opt-in to participation in the portal and database created under this section for the purpose of collecting certified payroll in compliance with a local prevailing wage ordinance or labor standards policy.

EFFECTIVE DATE. Subdivision 1 is effective July 1, 2026. Subdivisions 2 to 4 are effective July 1, 2027, and applicable to construction projects that begin on or after that date.

Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION; PAYROLL REPORTING PORTAL AND DATABASE.

\$...... in fiscal year 2027 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of administration for information technology costs and administration of the payroll reporting portal and database established under Minnesota Statutes, section 16C.37."

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance.

Pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 6, the bill was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration.
