Subd. 4. **Effect on nonpublic schooling.** Nothing in this section authorizes the Department of Education or any school district to exercise any additional control or supervision over, or to impose any additional requirements or restrictions on, any nonpublic school, nonpublic school student, or parent of any nonpublic school student.

Subdivision 1. **Requirements.** (a) Wetlands must not be drained or filled, wholly or partially, unless replaced by actions that provide at least equal public value under a replacement plan approved as provided in section 103G.2242, a replacement plan under a local governmental unit's comprehensive wetland protection and management plan approved by the board under section 103G.2243, or, if a permit to mine is required under section 93.481, under a mining reclamation plan approved by the commissioner under the permit to mine. Project-specific wetland-replacement plans submitted as part of a project for which a permit to mine is required and approved by the commissioner on or after July 1, 1991, may include surplus wetland credits to be allocated by the commissioner to offset future mining-related wetland impacts under any permits to mine held by the permittee, the operator, the permittee's or operator's parent, an affiliated subsidiary, or an assignee pursuant to an assignment under section 93.481, subdivision 5. For project-specific wetland

replacement completed prior to wetland impacts authorized or conducted under a permit to mine within the Great Lakes and Rainy River watershed basins, those basins are considered a single watershed for purposes of determining wetland-replacement ratios. Mining reclamation plans must apply the same principles and standards for replacing wetlands that are applicable to mitigation plans approved as provided in section 103G.2242. The commissioner must provide notice of an application for wetland replacement under a permit to mine to the county in which the impact is proposed and the county in which a mitigation site is proposed. Public value must be determined in accordance with section 103B.3355 or a comprehensive wetland protection and management plan established under section 103G.2243. Sections 103G.221 to 103G.2372 also apply to excavation in permanently and semipermanently flooded areas of wetlands.

(b) Replacement must be guided by the following principles in descending order of priority:

(1) avoiding the direct or indirect impact of the activity that may destroy or diminish the wetland;

(2) minimizing the impact by limiting the degree or magnitude of the wetland activity and its implementation;

(3) rectifying the impact by repairing, rehabilitating, or restoring the affected wetland environment;

(4) reducing or eliminating the impact over time by preservation and maintenance operations during the life of the activity;

(5) compensating for the impact by restoring a wetland; and

(6) compensating for the impact by replacing or providing substitute wetland resources or environments.

For a project involving the draining or filling of wetlands in an amount not exceeding 10,000 square feet more than the applicable amount in section 103G.2241, subdivision 9, paragraph (a), the local government unit may make an on-site sequencing determination without a written alternatives analysis from the applicant.

(c) If a wetland is located in a cultivated field, then replacement must be accomplished through restoration only without regard to the priority order in paragraph (b), provided that the altered wetland is not converted to a nonagricultural use for at least ten years.

(d) If a wetland is replaced under paragraph (c), or drained under section 103G.2241, subdivision 1, clause (1), the local government unit may require a deed restriction that prohibits nonagricultural use for at least ten years. The local government unit may require the deed restriction if it determines the wetland area drained is at risk of conversion to a nonagricultural use within ten years based on the zoning classification, proximity to a municipality or full service road, or other criteria as determined by the local government unit.

(e) Restoration and replacement of wetlands must be accomplished in accordance with the ecology of the landscape area affected and ponds that are created primarily to fulfill stormwater management, and water quality treatment requirements may not be used to satisfy replacement

requirements under this chapter unless the design includes pretreatment of runoff and the pond is functioning as a wetland.

(f) Except as provided in paragraph (g), for a wetland or public waters wetland located on nonagricultural land, replacement must be in the ratio of two acres of replaced wetland for each acre of drained or filled wetland.

(g) For any of the following, replacement must be in the ratio of one acre of replaced wetland for each acre of drained or filled wetland:

(1) a wetland or public waters wetland located on agricultural land or;

(2) a wetland or public waters wetland located in a greater than 80 percent area, ~~replacement must be in the ratio of one acre of replaced wetland for each acre of drained or filled wetland;~~ or

(3) a wetland or public waters wetland that is being replaced as part of a transportation project, regardless of whether the wetland or public waters wetland is located on agricultural or nonagricultural land.

(h) Wetlands that are restored or created as a result of an approved replacement plan are subject to the provisions of this section for any subsequent drainage or filling.

(i) Except in a greater than 80 percent area, only wetlands that have been restored from previously drained or filled wetlands, wetlands created by excavation in nonwetlands, wetlands created by dikes or dams along public or private drainage ditches, or wetlands created by dikes or dams associated with the restoration of previously drained or filled wetlands may be used for wetland replacement according to rules adopted under section 103G.2242, subdivision 1. Modification or conversion of nondegraded naturally occurring wetlands from one type to another are not eligible for wetland replacement.

(j) The Technical Evaluation Panel established under section 103G.2242, subdivision 2, shall ensure that sufficient time has occurred for the wetland to develop wetland characteristics of soils, vegetation, and hydrology before recommending that the wetland be deposited in the statewide wetland bank. If the Technical Evaluation Panel has reason to believe that the wetland characteristics may change substantially, the panel shall postpone its recommendation until the wetland has stabilized.

(k) This section and sections 103G.223 to 103G.2242, 103G.2364, and 103G.2365 apply to the state and its departments and agencies.

(l) For projects involving draining or filling of wetlands associated with a new public transportation project, and for projects expanded solely for additional traffic capacity, public transportation authorities may purchase credits from the board at the cost to the board to establish credits. Proceeds from the sale of credits provided under this paragraph are appropriated to the board for the purposes of this paragraph. For the purposes of this paragraph, "transportation project" does not include an airport project.

(m) A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for individual projects that result in the filling or draining of wetlands for the repair, rehabilitation, reconstruction, or replacement of a

currently serviceable existing state, city, county, or town public road necessary, as determined by the public transportation authority, to meet state or federal design or safety standards or requirements, excluding new roads or roads expanded solely for additional traffic capacity lanes. This paragraph only applies to authorities for public transportation projects that:

(1) minimize the amount of wetland filling or draining associated with the project and consider mitigating important site-specific wetland functions on site;

(2) except as provided in clause (3), submit project-specific reports to the board, the Technical Evaluation Panel, the commissioner of natural resources, and members of the public requesting a copy at least 30 days prior to construction that indicate the location, amount, and type of wetlands to be filled or drained by the project or, alternatively, convene an annual meeting of the parties required to receive notice to review projects to be commenced during the upcoming year; and

(3) for minor and emergency maintenance work impacting less than 10,000 square feet, submit project-specific reports, within 30 days of commencing the activity, to the board that indicate the location, amount, and type of wetlands that have been filled or drained.

Those required to receive notice of public transportation projects may appeal minimization, delineation, and on-site mitigation decisions made by the public transportation authority to the board according to the provisions of section 103G.2242, subdivision 9. The Technical Evaluation Panel must review minimization and delineation decisions made by the public transportation authority and provide recommendations regarding on-site mitigation if requested to do so by the local government unit, a contiguous landowner, or a member of the Technical Evaluation Panel.

Except for public transportation projects that occur on state roads, for which the state Department of Transportation is responsible for the wetland replacement, the board must replace the wetlands, and wetland areas of public waters if authorized by the commissioner or a delegated authority, drained or filled by public transportation projects on existing roads.

Public transportation authorities at their discretion may deviate from federal and state design standards on existing road projects when practical and reasonable to avoid wetland filling or draining, provided that public safety is not unreasonably compromised. The local road authority and its officers and employees are exempt from liability for any tort claim for injury to persons or property arising from travel on the highway and related to the deviation from the design standards for construction or reconstruction under this paragraph. This paragraph does not preclude an action for damages arising from negligence in construction or maintenance on a highway.

(n) If a landowner seeks approval of a replacement plan after the proposed project has already affected the wetland, the local government unit may require the landowner to replace the affected wetland at a ratio not to exceed twice the replacement ratio otherwise required.

(o) A local government unit may request the board to reclassify a county or watershed on the basis of its percentage of presettlement wetlands remaining. After receipt of satisfactory documentation from the local government, the board shall change the classification of a county or watershed. If requested by the local government unit, the board must assist in developing the documentation. Within 30 days of its action to approve a change of wetland classifications, the board shall publish a notice of the change in the Environmental Quality Board Monitor.

(p) One hundred citizens who reside within the jurisdiction of the local government unit may request the local government unit to reclassify a county or watershed on the basis of its percentage of presettlement wetlands remaining. In support of their petition, the citizens shall provide satisfactory documentation to the local government unit. The local government unit shall consider the petition and forward the request to the board under paragraph (o) or provide a reason why the petition is denied."

When the legislature is not meeting in regular session, a member may receive a per diem payment in the amounts and for the purposes as determined by the senate for senate members and by the house of representatives for house members.

(d) On January 15 in the first month of each term and on the first day of each following month, the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of representatives shall certify to the commissioner of management and budget, in duplicate, the amount of compensation then payable to each member of their respective houses and its total.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective July 1, 2026.

The forecasted expenditures in the February forecast must be zero for a department, institution, or agency of the executive branch if they were zero in the preceding November forecast as a result of the requirements of this paragraph. The commissioner shall not apply this paragraph to forecasted expenditures for the current biennium, but shall apply the requirements of this paragraph to the forecasted expenditures for the next two biennia.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 16A.11, subdivision 3, is amended to read:

Subd. 3. **Part two: detailed budget.** (a) Part two of the budget, the detailed budget estimates both of expenditures and revenues, must contain any statements on the financial plan which the

governor believes desirable or which may be required by the legislature. The detailed estimates shall include the governor's budget arranged in tabular form.

(b) Tables listing expenditures for the next biennium must show the appropriation base for each year. The appropriation base is the amount appropriated for the second year of the current biennium. The tables must separately show any adjustments to the base required by current law or policies of the commissioner of management and budget. For forecasted programs, the tables must also show the amount of the forecast adjustments, based on the most recent forecast prepared by the commissioner of management and budget under section 16A.103. For all programs, the tables must show the amount of appropriation changes recommended by the governor, after adjustments to the base and forecast adjustments, and the total recommendation of the governor for that year.

(c) The detailed estimates must include a separate line listing the total cost of professional and technical service contracts for the prior biennium and the projected costs of those contracts for the current and upcoming biennium. They must also include a summary of the personnel employed by the agency, reflected as full-time equivalent positions.

(d) The detailed estimates for internal service funds must include the number of full-time equivalents by program; detail on any loans from the general fund, including dollar amounts by program; proposed investments in technology or equipment of \$100,000 or more; an explanation of any operating losses or increases in retained earnings; and a history of the rates that have been charged, with an explanation of any rate changes and the impact of the rate changes on affected agencies.

(e) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) and any appropriation established in law, for any department, institution, or agency in the executive branch that is in a scheduled year under section 16A.111, subdivision 3, in the year prior to the year in which part two of the budget must be submitted, the appropriation base for any appropriation made to that department, institution, or agency for the next two biennia must be zero. The commissioner must display the appropriation base established under this paragraph in the tables and narrative of part two of the budget.

Sec. 3. [16A.111] ZERO-BASED BUDGETING.

Subdivision 1. **Zero-based budget.** (a) By November 30, each department, institution, and agency of the executive branch within a scheduled year must submit to the commissioner a proposed detailed operating budget for the biennium beginning July 1 of the following year using zero-based budgeting, including a zero-based budget plan. The commissioner of management and budget shall provide technical assistance to enable each department, institution, or agency to complete its proposed detailed operating budget as specified by the commissioner of management and budget.

(b) The commissioner of management and budget shall adopt policies and procedures for each department, institution, and agency to implement the provisions of this section.

(c) As used in this section, "zero-based budgeting" means a method of determining the budget of a department, institution, or agency for which the budget of the department, institution, or agency:

(1) is deemed to be zero in the November forecast, the February forecast, and the governor's budget recommendations that precede the establishment of a biennial budget; and

(2) has justified each proposed expenditure for the biennium covered by the budget as if it were a new expenditure.

(d) Each department, institution, and agency of the executive branch that is required to prepare a detailed operating budget and a zero-based budget plan under this subdivision must submit the detailed operating budget and zero-based budget plan to the legislature. This information must be submitted to the legislature at the same time that part two of the governor's budget is required to be submitted under section 16A.11, subdivision 1.

Subd. 2. **Zero-based budget plan.** A zero-based budget plan includes the following information:

(1) a description of activities that comprise the agency and a justification for the existence of each activity by reference to statute or other legal authority;

(2) for each activity, a quantitative estimate of any adverse impacts that could reasonably be expected should the activity be discontinued, together with a full description of the methods by which the adverse impact is estimated;

(3) a list of quantifiable program outcomes that measure the efficiency and effectiveness of each program;

(4) for each activity, an itemized account of expenditures required to maintain the activity at the minimum level of service required by statutory authority, together with a concise statement of the quantity and quality of services required at that minimum level;

(5) for each activity, an itemized account of expenditures required to maintain the quantity and quality of services being provided and the number of personnel required to accomplish each program; and

(6) a ranking of all activities that shows the relative contribution of each activity to the overall goals and purposes of the agency at current service levels.

Subd. 3. **Scheduled year.** (a) The scheduled year is 2024 and every ten years thereafter for the following agencies: Department of Administration; Department of Agriculture; Department of Commerce; Department of Corrections; Department of Education; Department of Human Rights; Department of Human Services; Department of Military Affairs; Department of Natural Resources; Department of Transportation; Minnesota Racing Commission; Office of Higher Education; and all advisory groups associated with these agencies.

(b) The scheduled year is 2026 and every ten years thereafter for the following agencies: Council for Minnesotans of African Heritage; Department of Employment and Economic Development; Department of Health; Department of Management and Budget; Department of Public Safety; Gambling Control Board; Metropolitan Council; Minnesota Council on Latino Affairs; Pollution Control Agency; Science Museum; Minnesota State Academies; University of Minnesota; and all advisory groups associated with these agencies.

(c) The scheduled year is 2028 and every ten years thereafter for the following agencies: Agriculture Utilization Research Institute; all health-related boards listed in section 214.01, subdivision 2; Council on Asian-Pacific Minnesotans; Department of Labor and Industry; Department

Subd. 1c. **Postgraduate practice.** A nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist who qualifies for licensure as an advanced practice registered nurse must practice for at least 2,080 hours, within the context of a collaborative agreement, ~~within a hospital or integrated clinical setting where advanced practice registered nurses and physicians work together to provide patient care.~~ The nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist shall submit written evidence to the board with the application, or upon completion of the required collaborative practice experience. For purposes of this subdivision, a collaborative agreement is a mutually agreed upon plan for the overall working relationship between a nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist, and one or more ~~physicians licensed under chapter 147 or in another state or United States territory, or one or more advanced practice registered nurses licensed under this section that designates the scope of collaboration necessary to manage the care of patients. The nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist, and one of the collaborating physicians or advanced practice registered nurses, must have experience in providing care to patients with the same or similar medical problems~~ of the following:

(1) physicians licensed under chapter 147 or in another state or United States territory who have experience in providing care to patients with the same or similar medical problems; or

(2) advanced practice registered nurses licensed under this section who have at least three years of practice as an advanced practice registered nurse and who have experience providing care to patients with the same or similar medical problems.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 148.211, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 1d. **Postgraduate practice in certain specialties.** Notwithstanding subdivision 1c, a nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist who provides services other than primary care services or mental health services in their first 2,080 hours of practice must complete their collaborative practice agreement in a setting where advanced practice nurses and physicians work together to provide patient care."

Amend the title accordingly

- (2) the person is registered to provide interstate telehealth services according to section 147.032.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 148.61, subdivision 5, is amended to read:

Subd. 5. **Gross misdemeanor.** It is unlawful for any person who is not a natural person to practice optometry in this state. Every natural person not licensed by the board pursuant to section 148.57 who practices optometry in this state shall be guilty of a gross misdemeanor.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 148.941, subdivision 6, is amended to read:

Subd. 6. **Violation.** It is unlawful for any person who is not a natural person to engage in the practice of psychology or misrepresent themselves as a psychologist or psychological practitioner. Natural persons who engage in the unlicensed practice of psychology or who misrepresent themselves as psychologists or psychological practitioners are guilty of a gross misdemeanor."
