Senator Ruud from the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Policy and Legacy Finance, to which was referred

S.F. No. 721: A bill for an act relating to tourism; appropriating money to Explore Minnesota Tourism.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance. Report adopted.

Senator Ingebrigtsen from the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance, to which was referred

S.F. No. 611: A bill for an act relating to environment; appropriating money for closed landfill program activities at Waste Disposal Engineering site in Anoka County.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Report adopted.

Senator Limmer from the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety Finance and Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 228: A bill for an act relating to driving while impaired; providing that DWI offenders are not required to take a specified examination as a condition of driver's license reinstatement; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, sections 169A.55, subdivision 2; 171.29, subdivision 1.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 2, line 5, strike "or 171.177"

Senator Anderson, B. from the Committee on Veterans and Military Affairs Finance and Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 54: A resolution memorializing the United States government to honor veterans by funding construction costs for proposed veterans homes in Bemidji, Montevideo, and Preston.

S.F. No. 179: A bill for an act relating to motor vehicles; authorizing registration and use of certain decommissioned military vehicles; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 168.10, subdivision 1h.

Page 2, line 27, after "a" insert "comparable"

Page 2, line 29, after "is" insert "eligible for a motor vehicle title under chapter 168A and is" and after the second comma, insert "equipment,"

Page 2, after line 30, insert:

"Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 168A.02, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Application for certificate of title.** (a) Except as provided in section 168A.03, every owner of a vehicle which is in this state and for which no currently effective certificate of title has been issued in this state ~~shall make application~~ must apply to the department for a certificate of title of the vehicle, pursuant to rules adopted by the department under section 168A.24, subdivision 2, clause 3 (3).

(b) A decommissioned military vehicle that (1) was also manufactured and sold as a comparable civilian vehicle, and (2) has the same size dimensions and vehicle weight as the comparable civilian vehicle, is eligible for a certificate of title under this chapter."

Senator Abeler from the Committee on Human Services Reform Finance and Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 342: A bill for an act relating to human services; permitting legal parent to petition for reestablishment of the legal parent and child relationship; prohibiting disqualification of individuals subject to human services background studies with expunged criminal records; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, sections 245C.14; 245C.15, by adding a subdivision; 245C.16, subdivision 1; 245C.22, by adding a subdivision; 245C.24, by adding a subdivision; 260C.329, subdivisions 3, 7, 8; repealing Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 260C.329, subdivision 5.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 1, delete section 1 and insert:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 245C.08, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Background studies conducted by Department of Human Services.** (a) For a background study conducted by the Department of Human Services, the commissioner shall review:

(1) information related to names of substantiated perpetrators of maltreatment of vulnerable adults that has been received by the commissioner as required under section 626.557, subdivision 9c, paragraph (j);

(2) the commissioner's records relating to the maltreatment of minors in licensed programs, and from findings of maltreatment of minors as indicated through the social service information system;

(3) information from juvenile courts as required in subdivision 4 for individuals listed in section 245C.03, subdivision 1, paragraph (a), when there is reasonable cause;

(4) information from the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, including information regarding a background study subject's registration in Minnesota as a predatory offender under section 243.166;

(5) except as provided in clause (6), information received as a result of submission of fingerprints for a national criminal history record check, as defined in section 245C.02, subdivision 13c, when

the commissioner has reasonable cause for a national criminal history record check as defined under section 245C.02, subdivision 15a, or as required under section 144.057, subdivision 1, clause (2);

(6) for a background study related to a child foster care application for licensure, a transfer of permanent legal and physical custody of a child under sections 260C.503 to 260C.515, or adoptions, and for a background study required for family child care, certified license-exempt child care, child care centers, and legal nonlicensed child care authorized under chapter 119B, the commissioner shall also review:

(i) information from the child abuse and neglect registry for any state in which the background study subject has resided for the past five years; and

(ii) when the background study subject is 18 years of age or older, or a minor under section 245C.05, subdivision 5a, paragraph (c), information received following submission of fingerprints for a national criminal history record check; and

(7) for a background study required for family child care, certified license-exempt child care centers, licensed child care centers, and legal nonlicensed child care authorized under chapter 119B, the background study shall also include, to the extent practicable, a name and date-of-birth search of the National Sex Offender Public website.

~~(b) Notwithstanding expungement by a court~~ For any action taken in this chapter, the commissioner ~~may~~ shall not consider the following information obtained under paragraph (a), clauses (3) and (4), ~~unless~~:

(1) a criminal record that was expunged under chapter 260B or 609A, where the commissioner received notice of the petition for expungement and the court order for expungement is directed specifically to the commissioner; or

(2) any underlying fact of an element of the expunged criminal record, including an arrest or criminal charge, where the commissioner received notice of the petition for expungement and the court order for expungement is directed specifically to the commissioner.

Nothing in this paragraph prohibits the commissioner from considering information from a separate administrative decision under this chapter.

(c) The commissioner shall also review criminal case information received according to section 245C.04, subdivision 4a, from the Minnesota court information system that relates to individuals who have already been studied under this chapter and who remain affiliated with the agency that initiated the background study.

(d) When the commissioner has reasonable cause to believe that the identity of a background study subject is uncertain, the commissioner may require the subject to provide a set of classifiable fingerprints for purposes of completing a fingerprint-based record check with the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension. Fingerprints collected under this paragraph shall not be saved by the commissioner after they have been used to verify the identity of the background study subject against the particular criminal record in question.

(e) The commissioner may inform the entity that initiated a background study under NETStudy 2.0 of the status of processing of the subject's fingerprints."

Page 3, delete sections 2 and 3

Page 5, delete sections 4 and 5

Page 5, line 23, delete "A legal parent" and insert "The county attorney or a parent whose parental rights were terminated under a previous order of the court"

Page 5, line 24, after the period, insert "A parent filing a petition under this section shall pay a filing fee in the amount required under section 357.021, subdivision 2, clause (1). The filing fee may be waived in cases of indigency."

Page 5, line 26, reinstate the stricken language

Page 5, line 27, before the semicolon, insert ". This clause must be satisfied only when the county attorney is the petitioning party"

Page 6, after line 6, insert:

"Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 260C.329, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 3a. Contents of parent's petition. A parent's petition for reestablishment of the legal parent and child relationship shall be signed under oath by the petitioner and shall state the following:

(1) the petitioner's full name, date of birth, address, and all other legal names or aliases by which the petitioner has been known at any time;

(2) the name and date of birth of each child for whom reunification is sought;

(3) the petitioner's relationship to each child for whom reunification is sought;

(4) why reunification is sought and why reunification is in the child's best interest;

(5) the details of the termination of parental rights for which reunification is sought, including the date and jurisdiction of the order, and the court file number and date of any prior order terminating parental rights;

(6) what steps the petitioner has taken toward personal rehabilitation since the time of the order terminating parental rights, including treatment, work, or other personal history that demonstrates rehabilitation;

(7) how the petitioner has corrected the conditions that led to the order terminating parental rights for which reunification is sought;

(8) reasons why the petitioner is willing and capable to provide day-to-day care and maintain the health, safety, and welfare of the child; and

(9) all prior requests by the petitioner, whether for the present order terminating parental rights or for any other orders terminating parental rights, whether granted or not."

Re-number the sections in sequence

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, delete "legal"

Amend the title numbers accordingly

Senator Abeler from the Committee on Human Services Reform Finance and Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 454: A bill for an act relating to human services; modifying certain background study requirements; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 245C.08, subdivisions 1, 3.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Page 2, line 17, delete "group residential housing services provider" and insert "home and community-based services provider licensed under chapter 245D"

Page 2, line 18, delete everything after "also" and insert "conduct a national criminal history record check,"

Page 2, line 19, delete everything before the period and insert "and review information from the criminal, maltreatment, and sex offender registries for any state in which the background study subject resided"

Page 3, line 4, delete "August" and insert "October"

Page 3, delete section 2 and insert:

"Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 245C.08, subdivision 3, is amended to read:

Subd. 3. **Arrest and investigative information.** (a) For any background study completed under this section, if the commissioner has reasonable cause to believe the information is pertinent to the disqualification of an individual, the commissioner also may review arrest and investigative information from:

- (1) the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension;
- (2) the ~~commissioner~~ commissioners of health and human services;
- (3) a county attorney;
- (4) a county sheriff;

- (5) a county agency;
- (6) a local chief of police;
- (7) other states;
- (8) the courts;
- (9) the Federal Bureau of Investigation;
- (10) the National Criminal Records Repository; and
- (11) criminal records from other states.

(b) Except when specifically required by law, the commissioner is not required to conduct more than one review of a subject's records from the Federal Bureau of Investigation if a review of the subject's criminal history with the Federal Bureau of Investigation has already been completed by the commissioner and there has been no break in the subject's affiliation with the ~~license holder~~ entity who initiated the background study.

(c) If the commissioner conducts a national criminal history record check when required by law and exclusively uses the relevant information under paragraph (a), clauses (9) and (10), to make a disqualification determination:

(1) this data is private and it cannot be shared with county agencies, private agencies, or prospective employers of the study subject; and

(2) the license holder or other entity that submitted the study is not required to obtain a copy of the study subject's disqualification letter under section 245C.17, subdivision 3.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective for background studies requested on or after October 1, 2019.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 245C.10, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 14. **Home and community-based services.** Notwithstanding subdivision 9, the commissioner shall recover the cost of background studies required under section 245C.03, subdivision 1, for a home and community-based services provider licensed under chapter 245D, through a fee of no more than \$..... per study charged to the license holder. The fees collected under this subdivision are appropriated to the commissioner for the purpose of conducting background studies.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective for background studies requested on or after October 1, 2019."

Amend the title numbers accordingly

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety Finance and Policy. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

Senator Kiffmeyer from the Committee on State Government Finance and Policy and Elections, to which was referred

S.F. No. 241: A bill for an act relating to state government; appropriating money from the Help America Vote Act account for certain authorized purposes.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 201.022, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 4. **Voter records updated due to voting report.** No later than eight weeks after the election, the county auditor must use the statewide voter registration system to produce a report that identifies each voter whose record indicates that it was updated due to voting. The county auditor must investigate each record that is challenged for a reason related to eligibility to determine if the voter appears to have been ineligible to vote. If the county auditor determines that a voter appears to have been ineligible to vote and either registered to vote or voted in the previous election, the county auditor must notify the law enforcement agency or the county attorney as provided in section 201.275.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 201.022, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 5. **Inactive voter report.** By November 6, 2018, the secretary of state must develop a report within the statewide voter registration system that provides information on inactive voters who registered on election day and were possibly ineligible. For elections on or after November 6, 2018, no later than eight weeks after the election, the county auditor must use the statewide voter registration system to produce the report. The county auditor must investigate each record to determine if the voter appears to have been ineligible to vote. If the county auditor determines that a voter appears to have been ineligible to vote and registered to vote in the previous election, the county auditor must notify the law enforcement agency or the county attorney as provided in section 201.275.

Sec. 3. **SECRETARY OF STATE; HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT APPROPRIATION.**

(a) \$1,534,000 in fiscal year 2020 is appropriated from the account established in Minnesota Statutes, section 5.30, pursuant to the Help America Vote Act, to the secretary of state for the purposes of modernizing, securing, and updating the statewide voter registration system and for cybersecurity upgrades as authorized by federal law. This is a onetime appropriation and is available until March 23, 2023.

(b) \$163,000 is transferred in fiscal year 2020 from the general fund to the Help America Vote Act account and is credited towards the state match requirement of the Omnibus Appropriations Act of 2018, Public Law 115-1410, and the Help America vote Act of 2002, Public Law 107-252, section 101.

(c) \$167,000 expended by the secretary of state in fiscal years 2018 and 2019 for increasing secure access to the statewide voter registration system is deemed: (1) to be money used for carrying out the purposes authorized under the Omnibus Appropriations Act of 2018, Public Law 115-1410,

and the Help America Vote Act of 2002, Public Law 107-252, section 101; and (2) to be credited toward any match required by those laws.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, after the semicolon, insert "requiring the use of reports produced by the statewide voter registration system;"

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

(1) The first deadline, March 15, 2019, at 11:59 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on bills in the house of origin.

(2) The second deadline, March 29, 2019, at 11:59 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on bills, or companions of bills, that met the first deadline in the other house.

(3) The third deadline, April 12, 2019, at 11:59 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on major appropriation and finance bills.

For the purposes of this resolution, the exemption from these deadlines provided for the House Ways and Means Committee in Joint Rule 2.03 does not apply to bills referred by the chair of the Ways and Means Committee to a division of that committee, that remain in a division, with the exception of a major appropriation and finance bill.

Any bills acted on by a division of the House or recalled from a division of the House or acted on by a Senate Committee other than those exempted in Joint Rule 2.03 after the second deadline

must be referred to the House Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration for disposition.

Either the House committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration, when reporting a bill referred to the committee in accordance with Joint Rule 2.03 and this resolution, may waive the application of the Rule and resolution to subsequent actions on that bill by other committees.
