S.F. No. 415: A bill for an act relating to public safety; regulating charitable bail organizations; requiring reports; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 629.

Page 1, line 7, delete the comma and insert "(1)"

Page 1, line 8, delete "(1)" and insert "(i)"

Page 1, line 9, delete "(2)" and insert "(ii)" and delete the period and insert a semicolon

Page 1, after line 9, insert:

"(2) "previous conviction" does not include a conviction if more than ten years have elapsed since the date of the conviction and the person's sentence has been discharged; and

(3) "violent offense" means:

(i) a crime of violence as defined in section 624.712, subdivision 5;

(ii) a crime described in section 243.166, subdivision 1b;

(iii) a violation of section 518B.01;

(iv) a violation of section 609.2242;

(v) a violation of section 609.749; and

(vi) a violation of section 629.75."

Page 2, line 1, delete everything after the first "a" and insert "violent offense; or"

Page 2, delete line 2

Page 2, line 3, delete everything after "has" and insert "a previous conviction for a violent offense or who"

Page 2, line 4, after "is" insert "currently"

Page 2, line 5, after "before" insert "registering with the state court administrator as required in paragraph (g) and" and after "(b)" insert ", clauses (1), (2), (3), and (5)"

SPECIAL ORDER

S.F. No. 1589: A bill for an act relating to health; establishing limits for contact tracing, digital contact tracing, immunizations, communicable disease testing, and the required disclosure of certain information; requiring the destruction of certain data; prohibiting mandatory digital contact tracing by employers; providing for civil penalties; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapters 144; 145; 181.

Senator Benson moved to amend S.F. No. 1589 as follows:

Page 2, delete subdivision 3

Page 3, line 27, delete "or the University of Minnesota"

Page 4, delete section 3

Renumber the subdivisions in sequence and correct the internal references

Amend the title accordingly

The motion prevailed. So the amendment was adopted.

Senator Westrom moved to amend S.F. No. 1589 as follows:

Page 4, after line 14, insert:

"Sec. 3. [145.678] COVID-19 IMMUNIZATION DISCLOSURE IN PLACES OF PUBLIC ACCOMMODATION."

(a) For purposes of this section, "place of public accommodation" has the meaning given in section 363A.03, subdivision 34, and "communicable disease" has the meaning given in section 144.419, subdivision 1.

(b) In order to protect the fundamental rights and privacy of Minnesotans and because vaccination status is protected health data, no place of public accommodation shall require the disclosure of a person's immunization status for the infectious disease known as COVID-19 prior to entry on the premises unless the place of public accommodation required the disclosure of immunization status for other communicable diseases as of March 13, 2020.

(c) Nothing in this section shall limit or alter an employer's ability to develop and maintain lawful workplace policies for employees.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

Amend the title accordingly
