S.F. No. 14: A bill for an act relating to child care assistance; modifying child care assistance rates; amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 119B.13, subdivision 1.

Page 1, line 6, strike "November" and delete "13" and insert "August 7"

Page 3, after line 12, insert:

"Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 119B.13, subdivision 4, is amended to read:

Subd. 4. **Rates charged to publicly subsidized families.** Child care providers receiving reimbursement under this chapter may not charge a rate to clients receiving assistance under this chapter that is higher than the private, full-paying client rate. This subdivision shall not prohibit a child care provider receiving reimbursement under this chapter from providing discounts, scholarships, or other financial assistance to any clients.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 3. **APPROPRIATION; CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.**

\$30,735,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$56,498,000 in fiscal year 2025 are appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for child care assistance payments under Minnesota Statutes, section 119B.13, subdivision 1.

Sec. 4. **APPROPRIATION; BASIC SLIDING FEE PROGRAM.**

\$31,468,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$41,412,000 in fiscal year 2025 are appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for the basic sliding fee program under Minnesota Statutes, section 119B.03. The base for this appropriation is \$46,171,000 in fiscal year 2026 and \$42,952,000 in fiscal year 2027.

Sec. 5. **APPROPRIATION; OPERATIONS ADMINISTRATION.**

\$151,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$157,000 in fiscal year 2025 are appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for administration of the child care assistance program and the basic sliding fee program. Of this amount, \$18,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$4,000 in fiscal year 2025 are for systems costs."

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, after the second semicolon, insert "appropriating money;"

Amend the title numbers accordingly

And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Amendments adopted. Report adopted.

Subd. 2. **Family eligibility.** (a) For a family to receive an early learning scholarship, parents or guardians must meet the following eligibility requirements:

(1) have an eligible child; and

(2) have income equal to or less than 185 percent of federal poverty level income in the current calendar year, or be able to document their child's current participation in the free and reduced-price lunch program or Child and Adult Care Food Program, National School Lunch Act, United States Code, title 42, sections 1751 and 1766; the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, Food and Nutrition Act, United States Code, title 7, sections 2011-2036; Head Start under the federal Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007; Minnesota family investment program under chapter 256J; child care assistance programs under chapter 119B; the supplemental nutrition assistance program; or placement in foster care under section 260C.212.

(b) An "eligible child" means a child who has not yet enrolled in kindergarten and is:

~~(1) at least three but not yet five years of age on September 1 of the current school year;~~

~~(2) a sibling from birth to age five of a child who has been awarded a scholarship under this section provided the sibling attends the same program as long as funds are available;~~

~~(3) the child of a parent under age 21 who is pursuing a high school degree or a course of study for a high school equivalency test; or~~

~~(4) homeless, in foster care, or in need of child protective services.~~

(c) A child who has received a scholarship under this section must continue to receive a scholarship each year until that child is eligible for kindergarten under section 120A.20 and as long as funds are available.

(d) Early learning scholarships may not be counted as earned income for the purposes of medical assistance under chapter 256B, MinnesotaCare under chapter 256L, Minnesota family investment program under chapter 256J, child care assistance programs under chapter 119B, or Head Start under the federal Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007.

(e) A child from an adjoining state whose family resides at a Minnesota address as assigned by the United States Postal Service, who has received developmental screening under sections 121A.16 to 121A.19, who intends to enroll in a Minnesota school district, and whose family meets the criteria of paragraph (a) is eligible for an early learning scholarship under this section."

Page 1, line 17, after "increased" insert ", to the extent possible,"

Page 2, delete section 2

Page 2, line 15, delete "\$11,000,000" and insert "\$12,250,000"

Page 2, line 18, delete everything before the period and insert "This is a onetime appropriation"

Page 2, line 21, delete "\$20,000,000" and insert "\$40,000,000"

Page 2, line 22, delete everything after "scholarships"

Page 2, line 23, delete everything before "under"

Page 2, line 24, delete everything after the period and insert "This is a onetime appropriation."

Page 2, delete line 25

Renumber the sections in sequence
