A Senate resolution

expressing the sense of the Minnesota Senate reaffirming its commitment to strengthening and deepening sister ties between the state of Minnesota and Taiwan.

WHEREAS, in 1984, the state of Minnesota established a sister-state relationship with Taiwan, Republic of China, and Minnesota and Taiwan have enjoyed strong bilateral trade, educational and cultural exchanges, and tourism; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan shares the same values of freedom, democracy, human rights, the rule of law, peace, and prosperity with the United States and the state of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, the United States ranks as Taiwan's second-largest trading partner. Taiwan is the eighth-largest trading partner of the United States, and bilateral trade reached more than \$856 billion in 2021; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan imported nearly \$3.9 billion worth of United States farm products in 2021, making it the seventh-largest market for United States agricultural products overall, the fourth-largest market on a per capita basis among the top ten United States agricultural export destinations, and the seventh-largest market for United States soybeans and corn, individually; and

WHEREAS, due to its high quality produce, the United States remains one of Taiwan's largest sources of agricultural products, supplying more than one-fifth of Taiwan's major agricultural imports; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan and the state of Minnesota have enjoyed a long and mutually beneficial relationship with the prospect of future growth, and Taiwan was Minnesota's fifth-largest export market in Asia in 2021, with \$526 million worth of Minnesota goods exported to Taiwan; and

WHEREAS, to strengthen the Taiwan-Minnesota bilateral economic relationship, it is essential to support Minnesota businesses to enhance their economic engagement with Taiwan based on the 1979 Taiwan Relations Act. Article 4 of the act stipulates that "wherever the laws of the United

States refer or relate to foreign countries, nations, states, governments, or similar entities, such terms shall include and such laws shall apply with respect to Taiwan," and it is therefore legitimate for Minnesota businesses to refer to Taiwan as Taiwan in conducting their business ties with Taiwan; and

WHEREAS, negotiations for a Bilateral Trade Agreement, the Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement, and the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework for Prosperity between Taiwan and the United States are an important step toward further strengthening bilateral trade between the two countries, thereby increasing Minnesota's exports to Taiwan and creating bilateral investment and technical collaboration through tariff reduction and other measures to facilitate trade; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan has undertaken a policy of "steadfast diplomacy" in its international relations. Taiwan is capable of and willing to fulfill its responsibilities and to collaborate with the world to deal with the challenges of humanitarian aid, disease control, and other issues; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of Minnesota that it reaffirms its commitment to strengthening and deepening the sister ties between the state of Minnesota and Taiwan, Republic of China.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Senate reaffirms its support for the Taiwan Relations Act and supports Minnesota businesses referring to Taiwan as Taiwan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Minnesota endorses Taiwan's efforts to secure the signing of a Bilateral Trade Agreement, the Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement, and the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework for Prosperity with the United States and reiterates its support for a closer economic and trade partnership between the state of Minnesota and Taiwan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Minnesota continues to support Taiwan's meaningful participation in international organizations that impact the health, safety, and well-being of the people of Taiwan, and supports Taiwan's aspiration to make more contributions in international societies.
